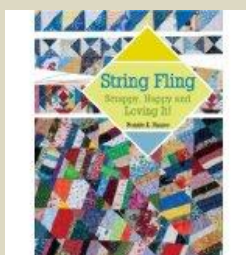
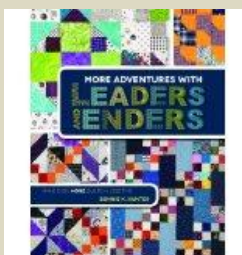

## Community Outreach

One lovely day, I joyfully spent six hours on the tractor, cutting grass! My insistence on performing this rather mundane activity has little to do with the fact that it has to be done – I enjoy being out in the fresh air, bouncing around and creating new patterns on the lawn, kind of like doodling or quilting. However, I realized today (composing this blurb, in the field) that the lull of the motor and the predictability of my path offers up the real bonus: I have lots of time to ponder and resolve issues floating around in my head!

Lately, the issues foremost in my mind are related to down-sizing our house and our material goods. Alas, this may be the last summer that I can 'mow & meditate'. The need to de-clutter and purge, brings mixed feelings – melancholy over the loss of well-loved items and euphoria over the sense of accomplishing the cleanup. My 'old' sewing studio was the first room to undergo a dismantling worthy of a military exercise – sort, pack, move – no



emotional 'petting' of fabrics allowed. The 'new' space is much smaller, so there was extensive purging (to deserving charities and friends) and, I must say, some rather clever and creative solutions to storing the diminished hoard, out of sight of my better half, at the other end. I was rather proud of that accomplishment – that is, until Sue Harrington called and asked: "Will you head up the Community Outreach group?" Sure – no problem! When a friend gently asked what I was going to do with the fabric, I had an "OMG" moment. In the back of my mind, I knew that there was fabric held for this purpose – I'd just forgotten that I'd be the one storing it! (A special thanks to Carol Cousins for doing so, these past few months!)

**Mowing meditation:** Where's it going to go? Not the current house – under realtor advice. Thank goodness for a tolerant husband, because it was a top-to-bottom, front-to-back, loaded van that pulled into the drive of the new house and deposited 75 cubic feet of fabric into the living room and onto kitchen counters! (P.S. more than triple what I'd given away).

**Mowing meditation:** What else is involved? I'd never paid attention! So, I went to the sources – the past chairs (thanks Joan Hett, Donna Reimer, Nellie Hanuta and Linda deVries) – and quizzed them thoroughly on their activities. The one piece of advice that rang out loud – get the "**BEE DAY**" booked! I don't know what's exactly happening that day, yet, but I'll fill you in next month. For now, please mark **SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 8th** on your calendars. It'll be held at Three Willows United Church.

**Mowing meditation:** What does one do with all the fabric? Step one – assess inventory; step two – call in reinforcements! Thankfully, the Committee members found the house, in spite of my directions, and waded into the stash quickly. We discovered 20 quilt tops and an untold number of 'orphan' blocks! It was amazing to see the group's creativity in finding solutions to use the 'misfits'. We organized a 'donation' bin and sorted the balance of the stash into bins. A special thanks to Nellie Hanuta, Wendy Oskham, Lisa Jones, Ann Jeffries and Gail Brown for pitching in and taking home "project challenges" - which will be the equivalent of about another 20 quilt tops, when completed! All of the tops will be making an appearance at an upcoming guild meeting, so be on the lookout. We will need volunteers to quilt and/or bind these, so visit our table and please consider taking one home to perform this small act of kindness! Yet, even after all of the culling, our stash is still overflowing. Based on quick estimates, we have sufficient fabric on hand, to make 100 – 150 quilts (a two – three year hoard), even if no further fabric added. (Yes, I still have a tolerant husband.)

**Mowing meditation:** What to do with an unmanageable stash? Proper storage of so much fabric is a major consideration and, to a lesser extent, varying the composition of the stash (e.g. colours, fabric types) on a routine basis. With this in mind and after consultation with the Guild's Executive, our Committee has determined that unused fabric, 'aging in the bin', does not serve our Guild's objectives. Therefore, commencing at October's Guild meeting (and until December, if supplies last), members will have the opportunity to ravish the stash. Seek out, take and use – however you'd like! We'd gladly accept a cash donation (if you choose) to support our 'Stoke the Stash' Fund – for the purpose of revitalizing our fabric stores.

## Our RCQG Quilt Show – May 1-2, 2015

Our 2015 Quilt Show will be hosted at Three Willows United Church. Our last show was spectacular because of all the exceptional quilts and we want our 2015 show to be even better. The Show Committee is already meeting and Show plans are well underway.

### What is the Quilt Challenge for this Show?

The Quilt Show Challenge is for all RCQG members. The Show Committee picks two fabrics and a theme then a kit is prepared. Each kit includes a fat quarter of each of the two fabrics. Members buy these kits for \$15 and this money helps pay incidentals for the show which includes paying the judges. A limited number of kits will be available, starting at the September meeting, and will be available at every meeting until all kits are sold.

There will be different categories into which a piece can be entered. For example, some categories will be best use of theme fabric, best embellishment and best mini. Size requirements will be specified. The Challenge Quilts will be hung as a group at the show and it will be impressive to see how differently quilters express, in their piece, their interpretation and feelings about the Challenge theme. Winning pieces will be given ribbons for First, Second and Third. Outside judges pick the winners. *Please consider participating in the Quilt Challenge.* Your quilt will be returned to you, with the ribbon if you are a winner!

Stay tuned for more information. The Show Committee will be doing a separate Newsletter to update you on the plans. We encourage everyone to purchase and participate in the Quilt Challenge and also to start thinking of quilts you would love to show. Don't lose out! Get your Challenge Kit soon! At our last quilt show there were around 50 Challenge Quilts. Let's do better this year.
