December is that festive time of year when we share time and camaraderie with family and friends. December's guild meeting will kick off the season in style as Kristy Finnigan guides members through the steps in making a beaded Christmas snowflake ornament.

Kristy is a new member of our guild and has been crafting since she could hold scissors. She has a wide variety of creative skills especially in the areas of beading and sewing. When Kristy was about 18, her mother began quilting and no longer had time to make Kristy's clothes. Having been used to custom-made originals, Kristy took up the challenge and began designing and creating her own wardrobe. This flair for design quickly moved from clothing to quilts (her mother's influence of course) and more recently into creating soy candles and custom jewelry.

The beaded snowflake pattern Kristy is sharing with us at our December meeting can be used with various size beads to create many different effects. We will be using size 6 beads to create a snowflake large enough for a coaster or tree ornament. Using size 10 beads, the snowflake can easily be attached to a brooch or used as embellishment on a Christmas quilt!



NOTE: The program committee is providing each member with a kit containing instructions, beads, and Nymo thread. **We are asking each member to bring a beading or regular sewing needle (to thread the beads) and a piece of felt or velvet for your work surface (this prevents the beads from rolling away from you!).**

PROGRAM FOR JANUARY



January brings a special treat for our group. One of our own favourite "in-house" members will be presenting a trunk show of her very special quilts. Helen Martin is well known for her fine work and has been a member of our Guild almost from its inception. Many of us will remember that at our last show, Helen's bowtie quilt took not one, but three awards. She has always enjoyed handwork, especially applique, and quilting was a natural extension of her talents when she started making quilts in the 1970s.

Helen's love of quilting has expanded into discovering the stories behind the quilts. Helen writes: "I inherited several antique quilts and tops over 30 years ago, but did not realize my passion for old quilts until many years later when my mother told me the story of her wedding quilt. Since then, I have learned the stories of early quilts and tops. Now I try to find out the stories of the quilts I collect. Even if no one is able to give a verbal history of a quilt, it can tell its own story through its fabrics, batting, colours, binding and even the thread it is sewn with. I encourage everyone to collect and document the stories of their family quilts before there are no longer any storytellers left." Following Helen's presentation, we will all rush home to spend cold winter evenings writing the stories of our quilts for our children and grandchildren!




BOOK REVIEW LAUREL MARSOLAIS

Hard Times,
Splendid Quilts:

The author takes quilt patterns originally published during the Depression in the Kansas City Star and adapts them to modern paper piecing methods. It is not difficult to imagine the pleasure these cheerful patterns brought to women whose lives were a dreary struggle with poverty.

The author provides foundation patterns for the twenty blocks in ten inch for standard quilts and four inch blocks if you would like to try a miniature quilt or wall hanging.

The gallery of ideas presents the blocks in a variety of settings, either as sampler quilts or wall hangings and quilts made with a repeated block.

You may choose to use pastel reproduction fabrics and recreate these blocks with their original 1930s look, or update them using batiks or modern prints. Either way, you'll enjoy experimenting with the possibilities

DOWN QUILTERS' LANE


Back in the day (before some of you were born!) we did most of our sewing using black or white thread with only the occasional hunt for matching thread for very special projects. How times have changed! Today we're presented with a veritable rainbow of colours and thread types so it is no problem matching thread to fabric. But what do we use with the multicoloured prints in our quilts?

Welcome to the world of neutrals - those threads that seem to just disappear into the fabrics! Just as in fashion or home decor, neutrals support the finished article quietly and unobtrusively. And the greatest of these are the grays which come in a wide variety of values - light to dark. Using a different value on the spool and the bobbin gives even better blending.

But we are not limited to the grays - khaki, brown, and even dark green frequently work very well on dark prints. On lighter prints we can use the old stand-by off-white but I have found the pale colours - yellow, pink, mauve etc often work even better. I discovered this by accident when I ran out of the off-white one night. So if you don't have a variety of these colours you might want to stock up on some of them so you have a greater choice when auditioning threads for your latest project.

A couple of more thread tips: Thread needles with the leading end of the thread as it unwinds from the spool which takes advantage of the natural twist of the thread. Clip thread at an angle to help it pass more easily through the eye of the needle.

Holiday tip - The long cardboard wrapping paper tubes make a great way to store wall hangings and avoid fold lines. If you are using them for long-term storage you might want to cover the rolls with acid-free tissue or foil.

BLOCK OF THE MONTH


DECEMBER • SNOWBALL

Traditionally the Snowball block is white or off-white. Since these blocks will become quilts for donation to the Community Outreach Committee, we suggest stripes, polka dots, tone on tone or a solid which will look more like a ball kids would kick around the playground.


Colour 1 – an 8" square of bright stripes, polka dots, tone on tone or solid

Colour 2 – four 2.5" squares in medium or dark which contrast with colour 1

Draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of the 2.5" squares. Place a 2.5" square on a corner of the 8" block, sew on the drawn line. Trim the seam allowance to ¼", press triangle created toward the corner, repeat for all corners. Refer to diagram for placement. Trim block to 8"x8".

January

JANUARY – X BLOCK

It may look like a plus sign (+) now but imagine it on-point and you'll see the X appear. Put this block with the Snowball from December and you've got Xs and Os (or hugs and kisses). We hope for lots of colour and lots of blocks to put together a Hugs and Kisses quilt which any child or young adult would be happy to wrap themselves in.

Colour A – one 3"x8" strip, two 3" squares (all the same dark tone or pattern)

Colour B – four 3" squares in medium or light in contrast to colour A

Sew together 3" squares to form a row of B, A and B strip, refer to diagram for placement. Repeat with remaining 3" squares. Sew 2 pieced strips on either side of 3"x8" strip. Press seams to dark colour. Trim block to 8"x8".

Each block donated enters you into the draw for participant prizes.


