BOOK REVIEW

Prairie Quilts: projects for the home inspired by the life and times of Laura Ingalls Wilder

The author owns a quilt shop across the fields from the original Plum Creek homestead of the Ingalls family. The location provided the impetus for the author to reread the stories, and the stories provided the inspiration for the more than 25 projects in this book. Some of the quilt blocks are mentioned in the books — others are typical of patterns used in the late nineteenth century.

For beginners, there are clear basic quilting instructions. For the more experienced quilter there is a sampler quilt of eleven different blocks (including appliqué), other projects include quilts (full-size and crib quilts), wallhangings, and table runners.

This book will appeal to quilters who love traditional quilts and reproduction fabrics. There is enough variety in the projects to challenge seasoned quilters and inspire the novice.

PROGRAM

We would like to thank everyone who participated and return the finished block from our September meeting. We had a total of 81 blocks turned in. Sometime in the next few months we will assembling the blocks together and you will than be able see the wonderful work you have done. Our silent auction raised \$92.00, and as we mentioned these funds will help to defray the cost for our guest speakers' travelling expenses.

<u>Prepare for the December</u> meeting:

For our next meeting, we will be making a mystery ornament.

Please prepare, either making a <u>finished</u> 7 inch square or 8 inch circle.

- Cut two contrasting fabrics, taking care to achieve good colour contrast between each pair that will be sewn together.
- Matching contrasting colours, and right sides together, sew pairs together by hand or by machine, maintaining an even \(^1\)4 inch seam allowance. Leave a 2 inch opening.
- Fold both seams inward toward the center of shape and press.
 If you are preparing a circle,

follow the curved line to make a nice, rounded curve. Turn right side out. For the square shape, poke a toothpick or an awl into the angles to assure crisp corners. Blind-stitch the opening closed.

Lightly press to reinforce the shape.

Feel free to bring both a square and a circle.

Please bring:

a needle, thread. scissors and

to embellish your ornament:

beads. lace. ribbon or any supply you might want to enhance your ornament.

This should be a fun night. This is a very easy project, and it is not a holiday ornament.

COLOUR

Colour Choices, Choices! by Joan Hug-Valeriote © 2008

Part Two Scrap-quilts

If you're into "brown-based" fabrics, the light "colour" might be a neutral which is not even a colour on the wheel, such as beige, (made up of the muddy brown that your water-colour paint-brush rinse-water turns to eventually – mixed with various amounts of white). And Heather Stewart's basic rule of thumb for scrap quilts is, first of all, to sort all your scraps into "white based" fabrics (including clear, bright hues and greys and blacks) and "brown-based" fabrics, which includes unbleached muslin, off-whites or creams and anything printed on a base that is not snow white, such as the Northcott, or Thimbleberries collection. Never the twain shall meet in one quilt or that patch will jump out at you and hit you in the eye! Now you know why!


If you're still unsure of your choices, copy nature or copy the experts. Go through a number of magazines quickly - don't dawdle on this exercise – and select a dozen photos that you really like, for the colours, not for the subject. National Geographic and interior design magazines are really good for this. Narrow them down to two or three that really grab you and analyse the colours in the photos before you pick the one you're going to copy. Those are probably the colours you are most drawn to, for whatever reason. They are your "intuitive" choices.


You can go to nature photographs that really appeal to you and choose the colours in the photograph, but be careful to keep them in approximately

the same proportions. Or, a tip from Heather Stewart, go to your favourite designer Kleenex boxes and choose the colours that their professional artist/designers spent hours and hours choosing and discussing before the boxes went to print. The same goes for interior design magazines.

And for those of you who like computers, if you look at a digital photograph and want to know what colours are in the photo, you can right click on the photo in Adobe Photoshop and see what colours plus white/black are actually used to create that colour. For dyers, this is a real bonus. It gives you the proper percentage in which to mix your colours. It took me a long time to find out that if I wanted anything other than a yukkie, muddy yellow, not to use black. That is what Heather calls the colour "YUK". It is, however, along with "GUK" (green and black) an excellent neutral. In order to get a browner, golder, yellow, I would need to add a little bit of both the other primary colours, red and blue....

And of course, John Willard is death on beige, so make sure that you also have in your stash a selection of blacks, whites and greys, or combinations of all three, for use as transitions between wild colours that just "don't go"....you'll be surprised what does "go"!

For those of you who do not know what a challenge is.....I will explain. Northcott Fabrics supplies to us two bolts of fabric. We cut these two fabrics into kits of two fat quarters each and sell the kits to you for \$15.00/kit. You take the fabrics and make a miniature or wall-hanging sized quilt, adding as many other fabrics as you wish. The guilts must follow a theme and the theme we have chosen is "What Makes You Smile?".

We made these 80 kits available for sale at the November meeting and we only have 20 kits left to sell. The money we generate from sales will be used to pay for judges, ribbons, prizes etc. and the quilts will hang as part of our next quilt show in October 2009.

So think about doing a challenge quilt even if you have never made your first quilt. The fabrics are gorgeous and the quilts don't have to be finished until next September.
