Mystery Block of the Month

We have received permission from a pattern designer to offer you this block of the month mystery for FREE to our Guild members making comfort quilts. Please respect the generous gift of the use of this pattern by not copying it for other people and by giving the pattern designer (whose identity will be revealed at the end) credit for this quilt design.

In the March newsletter will be the instructions for the sashing and the borders. The grand reveal of the mystery quilts will be at the June meeting. The finished size of the quilt is 60" x 72". See September's newsletter for recommended yardages.

Mystery BOM Tips (BE SURE TO READ):

- 3/16" of an inch is between the 1/8" and ¼" line. Most rulers don't show the 16ths. Using this measurement (if you have a perfect ¼" seam) makes your blocks accurate. However, if you want to make the block a little bigger and cut on the ¼" line and trim each pieced unit as you go along, you can do that too.
- Block #2 Patch A cut 4 squares 4 3/16" of the medium fabric, then cut diagonally twice...difficult to see in the graphics but you will be sewing 2 triangles back together of the same size to take up half of the Quarter Square Triangle block...doesn't seem to make sense to quilters to do this, but that's what the directions say. If you have any questions about this, please see Kathy at the break!
- Each month you will get 2 block patterns in the newsletter...this month it is block #3 and #4 and each month it seems there will be one that is easier and one that is a little bit harder. *WARNING...Block #4 is hard! There will be a prize draw to enter for each quilter who brings a block #4 to guild meeting!
- This is for your quilting fun, so if your block isn't coming together as the directions show, make up your own version (no quilt police here).




12 1/2" Block






Add the shorter sides, then the longer ones to complete the block.

Book Review

Kaffe Fassett's Simple Shapes Spectacular Quilts: 23 Original Quilt Designs

World-renowned fabric artist, Kaffe Fassett, shares hundreds of photographs of geometric inspiration from his travels. He explains how he



experiences the colours and shapes around him and translated them into his signature fabrics and vibrant quilts.

There are instructions for 23 gorgeous quilts. Some are super-simple, like Tilt, which is basically brick sized rectangles around a centre square of tilted rectangles – the gorgeous colour-scheme does all the work, you just do the cutting and sewing. Other patterns are more intricate, like Belts and Braces (a lattice block composed of various light and dark fabrics). The diamond patterns include Circle of Stars, and Bordered Diamond (a beautiful way to feature large-scale prints). The circular (and quarter circle) quilts include Tumbling Fans, Bow-Tie Circles, and Floral Snowballs.

My only complaint is that the cutting instructions use templates (unless the pieces are squares), rather than rotary cutting. I think that with careful examination of the instructions and the templates, most quilters could convert the instructions to rotary cutting.
