**Quilted Rug Class with Albert Cote – Additional Workshop Date** Sat. May 26/18, 9:30 – 3:30 at \$55

In this very innovative and fun class, students will create a beautiful one of a kind quilted rug. Using at least three to five fabrics plus batting and backing, we will layer the fabrics making a sandwich. Then students will "doodle" a design on the top fabric and stitch their design through all the layers. Once they have their design secured, they will cut through to the desired colours underneath and begin to see their rug pattern and colours appear. Once all the cutting is complete they will echo quilt inside the cut design.

## Community Outreach



We received 19 completed quilts at the March meeting. This is an amazing result. Two months in a row with 19 finished quilts each month! Once again, thanks is given to those of you who donated quilts and to those who participate in the work of the Community Outreach Committee.

On March 28<sup>th</sup>, Katrina Baklarz and I delivered 47 quilts to the Sexual Assault and Domestic Violence Care & Treatment Unit at the Guelph General Hospital. This brings the total number of quilts we've donated to 92. We are on target to exceed our goal of 100 quilts this year!

In March, I attached our last label bearing the logo of the Rotary Club of South Guelph. In January 2017, we received a monetary donation from the Club to purchase batting for 200 comfort quilts. To track our progress, we made 200 special labels which were attached to the quilts as they were donated. We have successfully completed our obligation to the Rotary Club of South Guelph. Well done everyone!

There is still room to join us at the Bee Day on April 14<sup>th</sup> from 9:00 till 4:00. We would love to have you attend. At this Bee Day, you can learn the quilt as you go technique and work on a quilt as you go project, or you can work on a kit to make a quilt top for the Community Outreach Committee. Many hands make light work. We appreciate all hands that help us.



# Helen Martin's Traditional Quilts Presentation

Helen Martin, one of our long-time members, delighted the Royal City Quilters' Guild members with her traditional quilts presentation. Really, it was a show of many antique quilts from Helen's collection. It was like living history since Helen collects not just the quilts but also the stories of the quilters and the fibres or fabrics used to create them. Below are some of the unique and personal quilts presented at our March 13<sup>th</sup> meeting.



Double Irish Chain Quilt Label (left)– Helen transcribed the history of the quilter Barbara Hoffman and attached the label to Barbara's quilt made in 1857.



Court House Steps Quilt (right) made by Mary German Mackie of Hanover about 1890. This pattern is a variation of the Log Cabin. It is made of woolen fabrics and batting.

Star of Bethlehem with Sunflowers and Oak Leaves Quilt (right)- The well worn, damaged original quilt, on the right, was made in 1870s. Helen's replica quilt on the left, was hand pieced and quilted by her.




Close up of Painted Fabric Quilt (left)

Penny Square Quilt - Penny squares were popular from the 1890s to 1930s. The squares could be purchased for a penny at local stores. The embroidery was done with red floss on this quilt and then quilted. Close up on left, whole quilt on right.



Crazy Quilt Block Quilt with Red Flannel Backing (left) – Red flannel backing is indicative of the 1870s – 1900s. The border of this quilt is made of red home spun wool and embroidered with variegated wool yarn.

Whig Rose Quilt (right) made in 1970s, with polycotton fabrics, by Helen's mother



Yo-Yo Bedspread (left) – This spread has a wonderful collection of 1930s prints and the 'bubble gum' pink of the period too.

Cross Stitched Embellished Quilt (full quilt on left and close up on right) – Cross stitch was completed by Helen’s mom who was in her 90’s and in a retirement home at the time. Helen completed the quilting.



A Priceless Poppy Quilt (left): Helen purchased a kit by Pam Bono Designs of Colorado and decided to make some changes to the pattern. Helen was told by the store owner that her quilt would decrease in value if Helen altered the pattern. Undaunted, Helen created her own unique quilt by adding poppy buds and changing the bright yellow centre and inner border to a softer yellow.

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
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## BLOCK OF THE MONTH: APRIL 2018 – COMING HOME

This is our final block of the 2017-18 Guild year. **We encourage you to turn in your completed blocks by the May Guild meeting.**

During an online investigation of other Guilds' activities, I found myself exploring the home website of the Fraser Valley Quilt Guild (fvqg.org). Interestingly, I found that they have been keeping a comprehensive log of all the patterns that they've used for their Block of the Month program, since the early 1990s, an excellent resource for our inspiration too! This month's choice comes out of that archive - a traditional pieced block, which they've called '**Coming Home**'.

There **will be fabric kits available at this month's Guild meeting**, so please stop by the Community Outreach table to collect yours. One of the colour variations will be the original red, white and blue scheme. The second colour variation will be based on 'fall' colours. Maybe we should call that one 'Flying Away'?



**Coming Home – Jan. 1993  
Fraser Valley Quilt Guild**

Choosing fabrics from your own stash? Make bold contrast choices in colours that complement one another. This block will create a stunning scrappy quilt of many colours.

### Kit Components

**Cornerstone Unit (RED)** ... 1 square @ 6.5" x 6.5"

**Half Square Triangle Units (BLUE & WHITE)** ... 29" x 4.5" wide strips of each colour

**NOTE: It is really important to the success of this block, that you are using a 'scant 1/4" seam'.** Check before you get underway: thread weight, needle sharpness and size, along with trimming and pressing can impact the end result.

### **Construction:**

1. Take the **WHITE** strip(s) and cut a total of **6 squares @ 4.5" x 4.5"**.
2. On the wrong side of each White square, draw a diagonal line from the top left corner to the bottom right corner.
3. Repeat step 1, with the **BLUE** strip(s), for a total of **6 squares @ 4.5" x 4.5"**.
4. Create the **Half-Square Triangle (HST)** units by pairing a white and blue square.
  - a. With right sides facing inward, use the drawn line as a guide to sew a scant 1/4" seam on each side of the center.
  - b. Cut units apart, using the diagonal line as a guide.
  - c. Press seams OPEN.
  - d. Repeat for all remaining squares.
  - e. Trim to **3.5" x 3.5" squares**. Yield = **12 HSTs**

5. Layout the components according to the pictorial diagram.
6. Sew the HST's together in groups of 4 HSTs. Press all seams OPEN.  
Four-patch unit should measure: **6.5" x 6.5" square**.
7. Sew one HST 4-patch to the side of the Red Block to form top half of block. Press seam open.
8. Sew remaining HST 4-patches together to form the bottom half of the block. Press seam OPEN.
9. Sew top and bottom halves together, matching at vertical seams. Press final seam OPEN.
10. Trim final block unit to meet **12.5" x 12.5" square**.

### **Block of Month Submissions**

*We appreciate your support in sewing up our Block of the Month patterns and hope that you enjoy our monthly offerings. Suggestions for future patterns are always welcome!*

*Many of our fabric kit offerings are cut from donated fabrics – some of which are 'unique' and in limited quantities. In order to make up the final quilt top kits, we depend on the timely return of all completed blocks.*

***We'd like to encourage you to return the finished blocks at the next possible Guild meeting.***

*However, if circumstance prevents this, please send a quick note to let us know when we can expect delivery of the kit (sewn or not).*
