We used a Show and Share format to provide new members with a framework for our chat. We shared stories about our projects and quilting interests, pattern and designer names, and names of instructional courses to improve skills and expand boundaries.

#1 - Tell Me A Story block

Amy Friend, the author of Intentional Piecing, runs a block swap every few months. The pattern used is in her book, and it's called Tell Me A Story. The concept is that the focus fabric in the centre and the colourful inner border fabric are used to convey a story. In July, she offered different winter themes, including Pink Christmas. Each block includes a different story, which is sent along with the block to each person in the group. Here's one of mine from Pink Christmas:

"Maurice was pleased - he finished at the top of his class at "Santa School" and was on his way to be Santa for his first Santa gig at the local mall."

#2 - Tag Along

I LOVE Studio 180 tools, and I've taken many classes this year to learn how to use them all. I'm also participating in Tag Along, which is a program where you receive a new block every two weeks, and then attend a class where you walk through how to make it with Studio 180 tools. It's a great way to practice using the tools to make different units. Here's one I made recently. I used to skip any patterns that had flying geese in them, but now that I've learned to make flying geese with the Studio 180 Wing Clipper, I look for patterns with them!




In Flanders Fields BY JOHN MCCRAE

If you are in the Guelph area, consider visiting the McCrae homestead (birthplace of Col. John McCrae) at 108 Water St., this coming month!

It's a national historic site and open for public viewing: Closed Mondays, 1:00-5:00pm Tuesday through Sunday



CHARACTER-DEFINING ELEMENTS:

Key features contributing to the heritage value of this site include:

- the rectangular footprint of the main house massed under two distinct rooflines, the original 1850-1860s single-storey portion under a hipped roof, and a later one-and-a-half-storey addition under a pitched roof with the main entry on the gable end;
- its prominent central door with top and side-lights;
- the presence of appendages including an open verandah across the front and shed-like rear additions;
- the stone construction;
- its centre-hall first floor layout;
- evidence of its pre-1875 interior materials, forms and finishes such as mouldings, doorways, plaster walls, floors, staircases, fireplaces;
- evidence of the pre-1875 interior layout and spatial volumes including basement rooms;
- its patterns of access and circulation, including the rear cellarway;
- its siting set back from the street on a grassed and treed lot with outbuildings;
- surviving landscape elements from the 1872-1873 period;
- viewscapes across the park to the Speed River;
- the house's setting in a sympathetic residential neighbourhood.

- quilt name
- pattern designer or original design
- quilter, if other than yourself
- artist's statement or brief history of the quilt limit of 50 words
- up to five photos of each quilt we recommend an overall view of the quilt along with several closeups of interesting details
- deadline for submission is February 3, 2024

You will be asked to upload your photos in the virtual quilt show section of the IQD website. To be able to do this, you will need to log in to your Google account. If you do not have an account, you may ask someone with an account to submit the photos on your behalf. Check out the International Quilting Day website for more details (click on photo above).

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Discussion: Scrap Management



Why does sorting scraps deserve its own day?

Fabric scraps often become a core part of the quilting experience – many quilt and sewing projects end with scraps. Making time to thoroughly sort, trim, and organize them is often put aside in favor of starting new projects.

By organizing your scraps, you can more easily find ways to incorporate them into future projects. You never know what fabric gems are nestled in your scrap pile right now!

Taking the time to organize your scraps is a great way to see what you have, be inspired to make something new, and encouraged to use what you have before procuring more. Get more information on the celebration by clicking on the MQG picture!

<u>Editor's Note:</u> Scrap management (can you really manage fabric?) is highly personal – what works for me, may not work for you. But it seems to be an inevitable topic of discussion whenever/wherever quilters gather:

- do you keep scraps?
- what is your minimum / maximum scrap size?
- do you sort by colour or size?
- what are you going to do with those?
- did you bring more scraps home? (my hubby has a good-humoured tolerance of my hobby at least most of the time)

I tend to keep lots of small (1" is my minimum) cut-off bits – sorted by colour, in baggies, in a larger tote box. Eventually, I'll grab a baggie and sew those tiny bits up into larger slabs of 'crumb' blocks, then store them again, until I have enough to make something useful. The challenge is not letting the bits overtake their designated 'holding' bin, but I admit to keeping them a little longer than I'd like (which ultimately messes with my sew-mojo!)

It's nice to have confirmation that I'm not alone with the management challenge and to be given the opportunity to partake in a broader community discussion on how others are tackling their 'precious' collections! So, consider joining in on the fun proposed by the "Scrap Summit" (click on the icon to register – it's FREE!) There are many individuals presenting, from varied sewing backgrounds, all coming together to discuss scrappy issues – organizational choices, techniques, and tips for working with scraps, projects to stir your creativity! While there's no right or wrong way to approach the issue, aren't new insights always valuable?


The Next Project: Quatrefoil from Missouri Star Quilt Company

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
Editor's Share:
