Throughout the day, they received a variety of emails asking them to send photos or write responses for a chance to win a \$50 gift certificate to a local quilt shop. We learned why quilting is important to our members.

We need you! How can you contribute to keep our Guild thriving? Without volunteers, we cannot offer the breadth of program and membership experiences that you've come to expect.



## International Quilting Day



### International Quilting Day is Saturday March 16, 2024

It is almost here!!! Be sure to register and attend part or all of the day. There will be door prizes drawn throughout the day. There will be discounts offered by some of the vendors. Head over to the website to check out the vendors and what they are offering for discounts and door prizes. See you there!!!

Keynote speakers - Kaffe Fassett, Dana Jones, Laura Coia Along with our three fantastic keynote speakers we have six concurrent session speakers: Maggie Dillon, Sarah Humphreys, Vanessa Génier, Emily Bailey, Peter Byrne, Michael Smith.

The Virtual Quilt Show at the International Quilting Day virtual celebration will include a special exhibit of International Sister quilts made for the community outreach program at York Heritage Quilt Guild. The blocks are fun to make. Click here for the tutorial to sew a block. Dig into your wildest scraps and celebrate International Women's Day on March 8 by making your own International Sister blocks! Here are some ideas:

#### Table or bed runner

Make one row of International Sister blocks set on point. As pictured, the table runner below finishes at 19" x 75.75." Each block changes the length of the table runner by approximately 14." Add or subtract blocks as desired. To make the corner setting triangles for the ends, cut two 8" squares in half diagonally. The setting triangles for the top and bottom are made by cutting 15.5" squares diagonally in two directions. Each 15.5" square yields four setting triangles. Add a 2.5" border to both top and bottom for a table runner finishing at 19" wide.



## Lap quilt

To make a lap quilt, make five rows of four International Sister blocks set on point. To make the setting triangles for the corners, cut two 8" squares in half diagonally. The setting triangles sides are made by cutting 15.5" squares diagonally in two directions. Each 15.5" square yields four setting triangles. Add 2.5" borders for a quilt finishing at 61.75" x 75.75".

## **Stash Busters**



Stash Busters will be completing the "Mini Petals" project this month and it's time to introduce our upcoming project for the months of April and May 2024, called "Balos Beach".

This is a free download pattern from Benartex – click here to access the file.

Balos Beach is a very flexible pattern with easy construction. It is Fat Quarter friendly and great for using up directional fabrics or large prints.

The finished quilt measures 55" x 65" if you follow the pattern, as provided. It's also easy to adjust the size by adding or removing borders, rows and/or columns.



Some Important Notes:

- Although the original pattern suggests 11 fabrics, I made the quilt shown in the photo with just 7 cuts. It is up to you!
- Additionally, I found it necessary to make two corrections, on page 2, of the original pattern:
  a) The horizontal sashing for block 1b. should be labelled L3, and not L2.
  b) The two A1 pieces should be cut 6 ½" x 17 ½" and not 6 ½" x 19 ½".

Give it a try. Have FUN selecting your fabrics. – Mariette D.

## Members Share (cont'd)

As I was in Florida (just a stone's throw down I-95), I took the opportunity to drive up to Raleigh, NC for QUILTCON 2024, last week. I was thoroughly entertained by lectures from Mary Fons, pertaining to her recent research adventures in tracking down information on the "The Artist & The Quilt Project", as well as "We Need to Talk About Bertha" (aka Bertha Meckstroth). There was a 'theme' of art world snobbery and quilters embracing their maker skills to demonstrate, resoundingly, that "Quilters are Artists"!

Jacquie Gering has long been one of my 'must see' personages. As this year's 'featured' artist, we were treated to a curated sampling of her quilts and a lecture, **"The touch of my hands, the soul of a quilter".** Both mediums highlighted the personal creative journey that she has been on, and the influence of both of her parents on her work and work ethic. The homage series of quilts that she created for her father's 90<sup>th</sup> birthday was both simple in design, colour and quilting but packed full of meanings. Humour, humility and often tears, led from one experience to another. Her clarity in acknowledging her love of teaching, her proven leadership skills and ultimately, her ability to see herself as an artist brought her into the Modern Quilt movement. Her books and classes are based on keen desire to 'share what little she knows', so that others can grow. As a strong 'cheerleader' and primary leader of the early Modern Quilt movement, it is hard to envision her absence from the stage: but she has announced her retirement from public speaking/teaching (she has a new grandchild arriving in April and wants to create space to enjoy that adventure). This was well worth the drive!

I was also thrilled to meet and chat with a couple of our past speakers, while at the show:



David Owen Hastings was featured in two lectures :

1) In concert with Theresa Dureya Wong - "20 Modern Quilts from around the world" featured quilters from Argentina, Guatemala, Italy, France, New Zealand, South Korea, and Switzerland! The quilt pictures, but more importantly, the stories were captivating.

2) His solo lecture was "Quilt Labels to Love". The message was one we heard resonating in other lectures: your work is your legacy ... make sure you sign your art. David shared his process for getting essential information onto his quilts.

**Melissa Marginet** was there to conduct workshops (that I didn't get to attend), but I had the opportunity to speak with her while in the Registration area. She mentioned that she had a quilt hanging in the show and I set about to find it – this is her quilt (on the right), "Reflect"!



**Stephanie Hackney (Hobbs Bonded Fibers)** was in her booth with samples of all the batting on display, of course. I took the opportunity to stop in and thank her for the excellent talk that she'd provided last November – based on feedback I've been getting from members. She apologized for the mostly bare booth: Hobb's factory had a fire last fall and she said they've been putting lots of effort into getting production back to 'normal' levels, so as to not disappoint any customers! Don't worry – they're almost there!

If you ever get the chance to attend a really big quilt conference – go for it! The visual works are eye candy and the enthusiasm everywhere is contagious! -- Cheryl C. (Editor)


## Cherrywood Challenge 2024

**Textile Museum of Canada** is located in downtown Toronto – steps away from City hall, Chinatown, and the Art Gallery of Ontario - at 55 Centre Avenue.

Hours of Operation are: Wednesday to Sunday, 11am – 6pm

Cost of Admission: Adults - \$15, Seniors (65+) - \$10 Youth (6-18) or Students - \$6 Members or Child (under 5) – FREE

Ticket reservations are encouraged.

A current exhibition (until April 28, 2024) is **"The Secret Codes: African Nova Scotian Quilts"**, curated by David Woods and organized by BANNS (Black Artists Network of Nova Scotia).

The free **"Square by Square Community Quilt Drop-In Session"** on Sunday afternoons (Noon – 5pm) is held at the Learning Hub.

The project is a living testament, an evolving work of art, crafted by participants, with each block representing a personal history and unique story. The intent is to foster unity and personal expression, while connecting people with diverse perspectives. Come visit, while you can – the program ends on Sunday, March 31<sup>st</sup>





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
