Ask Aly About: Spring Cleaning Your Sewing Machine



- The first thing you should do with your machine is clear all the dust and fluff in and around the bobbin case.
- Remove the needle (a good time to get a new one) and, using a Q Tip, a small vacuum cleaner, or a clean brush, clear out the fluff that you see.
- Make sure to clear it from between and around the feed dogs.
- Feel free to drop the Q Tip or brush into the open areas around the bobbin case. It's amazing what you can pull up from underneath the machine this way.
- Turn the hand wheel a bit at a time so you are able to access different areas.
- Ensure the bobbin case is clean. Use a piece of thread a small pin or thin floss to clear the area under the silver piece on the bobbin casethe tension spring. Small bits of fluff can gather in there.



Important:

Please do not use canned air on your machine. The propellant can actually add moisture to your machine and moisture is not your friend. It can cause rusting over time.

If your machine requires oil, it's time to add it where the manufacturer advises. Generally, this is going to be on the race of the bobbin cover (the pointy part).

I hope these basic tips help you enjoy a long life with your sewing machine. Remember, it's a machine and not an appliance. As such, it requires more care to keep it, and you, healthy and happy.

Summer Mystery Quilt Along

Are you a mystery lover?

Join the "Miss Marple" Summer Mystery Quilt Along. The "Miss Marple" pattern has been designed by Pat Speth and uses lots of five-inch squares. It's a great way to use fabrics from your stash, including fat quarters, charm packs or layer cakes. You also have three finished sizes to choose from: lap, full or queen.

It is rated as an 'easy' project – perfect for those brief moments spent indoors, this summer!

Materials	Lap (56" x 56")	Full (76" x 96")	Queen (96" x 96")
5" squares in assorted	47 pairs and	111 pairs and	139 pairs and
mediums and darks	32 singles	71 singles	92 singles
	(11 fat quarters)	(25 fat quarters)	(31 fat quarters)
Background fabric	1-1/2 yards	3-1/8 yards	3-3/4yards
Binding	2/3 yard	7/8 yard	1 yard
Backing	3-5/8 yards	5-3/4 yards	8-5/8 yards
Batting	60" x 60"	80" x 100"	100" x 100"

Yardage is based on 42" wide fabric. A pair is defined as two squares that are the same fabric. Choice of background fabric should be a high contrast to your darks and mediums. If you prefer a more rectangular quilt extra rows or borders can easily be added.

The Summer Mystery Quilt will run for seven weeks beginning July 1st. Instructions will be emailed to you each Monday. If interested, contact the project leader: kimwaynehollingshead [at] gmail.com



The Community Fabric Project, presented by Art Not Shame, is a free ten-week series that kicked off February 26. Along with project collaborators Guelph Neighbourhood Support Coalition and the Guelph Civic Museum, participants work together to create a community quilt reflecting the experiences of Guelph's diverse communities.

The finished quilt will be included in an exhibition at the Guelph Civic Museum and will be housed in Art Not Shame's new community arts hub. The project is open to people of all ages. 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The Guelph Tool Library has launched a new program, Stitch Together: A Community Mending Project, which offers a safe and social environment to work on clothing repair alongside skilled volunteers. "As a society, we throw away vast amounts of stuff, even things with almost nothing wrong that could get more use from a simple repair," said Guelph Tool

Library communications and outreach coordinator Stephanie Clarke. "We felt it was a natural extension of our repair café program that we offer once every other month. A number of volunteers from that initiative were interested in starting something that was a little more frequent and a little more social, focused just on clothing repair."

Since 2016, the Guelph Tool Library provides sustainability-savvy individuals and groups with low-cost, space-saving access to a variety of equipment. The volunteer driven, membership-based rental library includes tools and resources for an array of do-it-yourself activities including gardening, construction and home renovations or repairs, and crafting.

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Royal Ontario Museum, Toronto ON Celebrates the Artistry of Quilts in Canada


This summer, the **Royal Ontario Museum (ROM)** will celebrate the artistry of quilt making with a new exhibition highlighting remarkable Canadian-made quilts. Showcasing significant quilts drawn from ROM's extensive collection, *Quilts: Made in Canada* opens on **June 29** and runs through to **November 14**, **2024.** General Adult Admission: \$26



Quilts: Made in Canada will present over twenty exceptional examples of quilting from the 1850s through to the present. In pieces from across the country, the tradition of quilt making in Canada reveals a long-standing commitment to the reuse of materials, as well as the importance of community. Throughout the exhibition, visitors will encounter intricate designs and handmade details that capture everyday life in both historic and contemporary Canada, further illustrating the enduring relevance and power of the medium.








Quilt Canada 2024 ---- June 19-22
